


Capital Repertory Theatre

CAPITAL REPERTORY THEATRE has a rich, local history of excellent entertainment and strong community relationships. Established in 1981, it came into existence through the dedication and perseverance of a group of Albany business, community and civic leaders. Donated labor, materials and expertise transformed the National Biscuit Co., a two-story-and-basement industrial building, constructed in 1888, located at 251 North Pearl Street, into what was to become the home of Albany's first professional resident theatre.

Outreach was made to The League of Theatre Artists, a group of diverse actors, directors and playwrights, who spent summers at Art Awareness in Lexington. Working together, these artists, community leaders and an army of volunteers founded Capital Repertory Company. This initial investment of time and resources created the highly acclaimed, award-winning Capital Repertory Theatre with an annual operating budget of \$2.3 million, and a history of producing more than 5,000 performances, employing more than 1,500 professional artists.

In all programs and services, theREP serves its mission by embracing the community as a source of inspiration. We embrace cast, crew and audiences from every background to expand the horizons of thought and understanding of the human condition through the power of theatre.





WHERE DID THE VAMPIRE MYTH COME FROM ANYWAY?

An entire genre of literature, film and television have followed on from Bram Stoker's 1897 novel, *Dracula*. A genre where vampires live, have supernatural powers, and hunt humans (mostly but not always) to drink their blood. The list is long and varied, with pieces such as: *Interview With a Vampire* (the Ann Rice novel turned into film), *Dracula: Dead and Loving It* (the film comedy starring Leslie Neilsen), *Nosferatu* (the silent horror film from 1922), *Dracula* (the 1931-43 trilogy of films starring Bela Lugosi), *Twilight* (the YA book and film series), *Marked* (a YA book series about Vampires who are marked, not bitten), *Hotel Transylvania* (the cartoon films that center around Count Dracula), Sesame Street's counting Count Dracula, *Riverdale* (the TV series) and so many more.

But where and how did it all start?

Stoker's novel may have been the springboard for the literary (and more) genre, but the lore of vampirism existed well before he put pen to paper creating the now, truly, immortal Count

Dracula. The idea of the *nosferatu* (or the undead, as the word was thought to mean), was "alive" and well in the lore of Central European folktales. And it is from this lore, and some other sources of inspiration, that the Count in Stoker's novel was born

One such source of folkloric information was the two-volume "survey" done by 18th-century Benedictine monk and distinguished biblical scholar, Antoine Augustin Calmet. Calmet's Dissertations Upon the Apparitions of Angels, Daemons, and Ghosts, and Concerning the Vampires of Hungary, Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia, which was published in 1746, contained carefully collected and examined reports of "vampire attacks" that were emerging from eastern Europe in late 17th and early 18th centuries. His documentation included accounts from those


who'd seen the dead "come back to earth, talk, walk, infest villages, suck the blood of their near relations, destroy their health, and finally cause their death." These undead, Calmet noted, were called by the name of vampire.

In one of his most famous accounts, Calmet "documented" the tragedy of Serbian soldier, Arnold Paole, who was alleged to have been the victim of a vampire, before turning into one himself. Paole attempted to rid himself of all traces of the vampire by eating dirt from his grave and smearing himself with the vampire's blood, apparently to no avail. A month after his death, in a hay wagon accident, villagers claimed to have seen Paole rise from the dead and kill several people, as well as attack and drain the blood from a variety of animals and livestock.

Suspecting vampirism, the villagers dug up Paole's body – which they found "intact" with freshly grown fingernails and "fresh" blood covering the inside of the coffin. To stop Paole from further vampire attacks in the village, they drove a stake through his heart, from which copious amounts of blood spilled as he gave an audible groan. The villagers repeated such "killings" on other dead bodies they suspected were vampires, hoping to "kill" them for good.

It is also widely speculated that Stoker was inspired by the historical accounts of 15th-century Romanian prince, Vlad Tepes – more commonly known as Vlad the Impaler, and his thirst for blood.

Calmet goes on to talk of several things that he, and others of the time, believed to be proof that one who had died was a vampire. Things that have since been proven, scientifically, to be facts about the stages of human decomposition. For instance, we now know that one's hair and nails continue to grow for a period of time after death, and that bodies buried in different climates/temperatures will decompose differently and at different rates. While we may understand this scientific information today, it is easy to see how Stoker, and other gothic writers of the late 17th and 18th centuries, drew inspiration from Calmet's accounts and perhaps, pondered the reality of vampirism in their day.

FUN FACT: The word *nosferatu*, which was often, mistakenly, thought to be an ancient Romanian word referring to the undead, is much more likely to be a mistranslation of an Old Slavonic word, *nesufur-atu*, borrowed from the Greek *nosophoros* meaning "plague carrier." Folklore linked the idea of vampires with the spread of disease - specifically tuberculosis, whose cause was not yet known. Folks were convinced that the spread of infection was down to the bite of a vampire.

Stoker learned that Vlad Tepes was born in Transylvania as the second son of the nobleman Vlad II Dracul, and that Tepes would go on to take the name Dracula (which means son of Dracul) when he was initiated into a secret order of

of Dracula, would convince many scholars that he provided a great deal of inspiration for Stoker's famous vampire, Count Dracula.



As the ruler of Walachia, an area now a part of Romania, Vlad the Impaler, as he was now known, became notorious for the brutal tactics he employed against his enemies - chief among them was impalement. He would drive a wooden stake through his victim's bodies, leaving them to die of exposure. Some particularly gruesome accounts of Vlad the Impaler report of his dining among the impaled bodies of his victims, dipping his bread into their blood before consuming it. It's not hard to see that such gory details of a man who was born in Transylvania and who legally adopted the name

Christian Knights known as the Order of the Dragon. (Fun fact: in Romanian, Dracul means "dragon.")

Yet another source of inspiration for Stoker, was a shipwreck that took place 137 years ago, on October 24, 1885. That October 24th, a storm hit Whitby, Yorkshire, England and caused the ship – the Dmitry, which had left port in Narva (modern-day Estonia) – to run aground - with little to no survivors aboard. Stoker traveled to Whitby and interviewed several members of the Royal Coast Guard about the wreck ... and wouldn't you know, the fictional ship that Count Dracula travels to Whitby, England on, would be called the Demeter.

While Bram Stoker is noted as the first to write fiction about vampires, the allure of the undead is centuries old. And while said undead certainly do not roam for real, the reality is, from the late 1800's, vampires live ... in print, film, TV and on the stage.

Even now, 2022, new adaptations of the original tale are emerging, such as the one you are about to see by Gordon Greenberg & Steve Rosen, as well as new comic books, video games, TV shows novels and more, that center on the life (un-life?) of the "vampire." One might say that Stoker and his Dracula truly are immortal!

FUN FACT: Did you know that when *Dracula*, starring Bela Lugosi was made (released in 1931), the exact same story was being filmed by a Spanish cast - at night, on the exact same set!?! Many say it is superior to Lugosi's *Dracula*.
