A Note from the Director

"Honky Tonk Angels" premiered at the American Theatre Company in Tulsa, Oklahoma in May of 1998. Written by Ted Swindley and featuring the classic music of Tammy Wynette, Loretta Lynn, Kitty Wells, Bobbie Gentry and Dolly Parton (among others), as well as some traditional songs, it has since been seen across the nation in hundreds of successful productions over the last 25 years.

"Honky Tonk," as told by three gals following their "Music City" dreams to Nashville, is a favorite of country music fans and theatregoers alike and often creates new ones with every performance. The popularity of the show led author Swindley to create two sequels. "The Honky Tonk Angels Holiday Spectacular" has the Angels story continuing with more hits and hijinks at a reunion concert. In "Honky Tonk Angels and the Mystery of Bubba's Revenge!", a country western-style Halloween seance, a foot-stompin' gospel jubilee, and a "psychically sensitive" beer-drinkin' Bubba all combine in the final installment of the trilogy. No doubt, all three shows will endure for many years to come.

Swindley, a South Carolinian, is best known for creating the entertaining and touching musical, "Always...Patsy Cline." This hugely successful show was an earlier foray into the country music oeuvre and celebrates the legendary life and music of Patsy Cline, who tragically died at the age of thirty at the peak of stardom. Swindley, who has always loved the powerful voices of archetypal female country singers, found a way to feature them live in all these shows, with a little sass, a lot of humor and a good dose of warmth thrown in for good measure.

As we all know, the last few years have been challenging. So, we felt some very tuneful music and a little light-hearted fun was in order. Mark, the cast and I have had a wonderful time working on



this show. Heartfelt thanks to my wonderful designers and theREP collaborators and author Ted Swindley for his continued friendship. A special thank you to Artistic Director Maggie Mancinelli-Cahill for welcoming me into her artistic family with love and trust.

We have had more than a few laughs in rehearsal and have found the music to be iconic, entertaining and often inspiring. We celebrate the themes of the power of friendship, never letting go of your dreams and women's empowerment. We hope you will too.




"Honky Tonk Angels," written by Ted Swindley, premiered in May 1998 in Tulsa, OK, at the American Theater Company. Following three girls on their way to fulfilling their dreams of country music stardom, "Honky Tonk Angels" is "a highly enjoyable revue" and "a raucous and enjoyable evening of entertainment," according to the Chicago Tribune and the North Bay Stage and Screen, respectively.

It is the first musical in a trilogy; also featuring the Christmas-themed "Honky Tonk Angels Holiday Spectacular" and Halloween-themed "Honky Tonk Angels and the Mystery of Bubba's Revenge!" All three shows are packed with classic country music hits—hits that would not exist without the dozens of women who developed the country genre.

1920s

*Country music groups with her sister-in-law
Mother Maybelle Carter and her husband. Calling
the group the Carter Family, they traveled from
Maces Springs, VA, to Bristol, TE, to record songs
that quickly became successful. On her 1928 songs
"Will the Circle Be Unbroken" and "Wildwood
Flower," Maybelle uses a guitar technique now
called the "Carter Scratch" that is considered the
moment where "country music" emerges. The
Carter Scratch involves strumming the top strings
and picking out the melody on the bottom strings.
Listen to "Wildwood Flower" at the end of the
document and try to pick out the Carter Scratch.



1930s




Country music began being played on radio programs like the Grand Ole Opry and Chicago's National Barn Dance. Kitty Cora Cline became the Grand Ole Opry's first female soloist in 1928 and performed on the radio show throughout the 30s. The Opry House in Nashville, TE, is known as the home of country music. Patsy Montana had a "yodeling cowgirl style" that broke her out of just the Chicago Barn Dance and later got her inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1996. Listen to "I Wanna Be a Cowboy's Sweetheart" at the end of the document.

Minnie Pearl, a comedienne from the Southern independent theater circuit, brought her hillbilly humor to the Grand Ole Opry. Greeting the audiences with "How-w-w-DEE-E-E-E! I'm jest so proud to be here!" then telling them funny stories about her hometown of Grinder's Switch, TE. Her hillbilly humor went on to inspire the character of country music. Listen to her iconic greeting at the end of the document.




1950s



Getting her start as the frontwoman in the Tennessee Hillbillies and the Tennessee Mountain Boys, Kitty Wells released "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels" in 1952.

The song became the first single by a female singer to hit number one on the Billboard Country Music chart, where it lived for six weeks. It is the song the musical is named after and appears in all three musicals of the "Honky Tonk" trilogy.

Wells produced thirty-six top-ten country singles, becoming the first solo country artist to have a number-one single, sell a million records and headline a major tour. She was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1976. Listen to "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels" at the end of the document.



1960s

The combination of pop and country transformed the genre into "countrypolitan," a smoother sound further from the bluegrass/folk roots of the genre. Both Patsy Cline and Loretta Lynn got their start in the late 50s, gaining star status by the 60s. Patsy Cline's hits "I Fall To Pieces" and "Crazy" helped evolve the country sound to more modern music. She died in 1963 in a plane crash. She was the first solo female artist inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame (1973).





Loretta Lynn created a reputation as an outspoken feminist housewife, releasing hit songs like "I'm a Honky Tonk Girl" and "Don't Come Home A Drinkin' (With Lovin' on Your Mind)." She released "Coal Miner's Daughter" in 1970, an autobiographical song that was her first single to chart on the Billboard Hot 100. Vibrant and active until her death in 2022, Lynn is known as the most famous female country artist to date.

Listen to their hits "I Fall to Pieces" and "Coal Miner's Daughter" at the end of the document.

In 1969, Linda Martell became the first Black female artist to have a Top 25 country song with her cover of "Color Him Father" by The Winstons. She was also the first Black woman to perform on the Grand Ole Opry.

Unfortunately, her career was relegated to obscurity because of her race, and while other Black country artists were inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame, Martell was not. Listen to her cover of "Color Him Father" at the end of the document..




1970s


Known as one of the most iconic decades for country music, the 70s created famous female country singers like Tammy Wynette, Dolly Parton, and Tanya Tucker, as well as bolstering the fame of established artists like Loretta Lynn.

Wynette released albums with her husband George Jones with superficially joyous songs that had an undercurrent of sadness that may have stemmed from their tumultuous relationship.





In 1974, Parton split from her husband and sang "I Will Always Love You," catapulting herself to global iconicity and creating a reputation of charity and kindness. Parton holds the record for most number-one songs by a female artist on the Billboard Hot Country chart (25!). Listen to "I Will Always Love You" at the end of the document.









The Pointer Sisters won two Grammy awards (Best Country Song and Best Country Music Performance) in 1974 for their single "Fairytale." Having a "countrified" soul sound, the Pointer Sisters went on to have ten top-40 singles between 1974 and 1983. Being a Black girl group, the Sisters struggled against being unfairly categorized into certain genres and subjected to racist marketing, but their songs had a subtle undercurrent of feminism that inspired future female country and pop artists. Listen to "Fairytale" at the end of the document.

Nominated in 1975 for country music's most promising female vocalist, Ruby Falls was a Black woman who became one of only five to chart on the Billboard Top Country chart. In October 1977, her song "You've Got to Mend This Heartache" reached number 40, which was her peak spot on the chart. She had a small tour throughout the 80s, but she died suddenly in mid-1986. Her success has been mostly lost to history. Listen to "You've Got to Mend This Heartache" at the end of the document.





1980s

In the 80s, Tanya Tucker became emblematic of country's shift towards "outlaws" and its rising acceptance into mainstream American culture. She had 14 top-10 Billboard Country singles, survived addiction, starred in films, and dated many men. She won two Grammy awards in 2020 and is possibly country's most prominent female outlaw and survivor.



Dolly Parton wrote songs for "9 to 5," a film she starred in alongside Jane Fonda, Lily Tomlin, and Dabney Coleman. In 1981, the titular song reached the top of Billboard's Country, Hot 100 and Adult Contemporary charts.

In 1983, she reached the global number one spot with "Islands in the Stream," a duet with Kenny Rogers. She received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 1984 after starring in other feature films, then opened Dollywood, an amusement park in her name, in 1985. Listen to "Islands in the Stream" at the end of the document.

Reba McEntire became a platinum-selling Hall of Fame country singer via her 1986 song "Whoever's in New England." The video for the song was country music's first big pop-inspired video success, allowing McEntire to become a television star with hundreds of appearances, including her sitcom, "Reba" which aired from 2001-2007. Watch the original music video for "Whoever's in New England" at the end of the document.



With her 1987 song "Green Eyes (Cryin' Those Blue Tears)" peaking on the Billboard's Hot Country chart at 62, Dona Mason became the last Black woman to have a song on the Billboard country singles chart until Rissi Palmer in 2007.


In 1987 Nisha Jackson competed on TNN-TV's country talent TV show "You Can Be a Star," becoming the grand champion. Her song "Alive and Well" then charted on the Billboard Top Country, making her one of five Black female solo artists to chart.

Listen to "Green Eyes" and "Alive and Well" at the end of the document.

1990s

Shania Twain is one of the most famous


Shania Twain is one of the most famous female country artists from the 1990s. Born in Canada, her 1995 track "Any Man of Mine" became her first numberone on the Billboard Country chart and her song "You're Still The One" crossed over to the top ten on the global charts.



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Dozens more female country artists who sold as many or more albums as their male competitors appeared in the 90s. LeAnn Rimes' song "How Do I Live" in 1997 became the most successful song of the 1990s according to Billboard Magazine.

Trisha Yearwood sold over ten million albums in ten years. Faith Hill became country music's last number-one Billboard Hot 100 single of 1999 with "Breathe," which she won the Best Female Country Vocal Performance Grammy for in 2001. Listen to "How Do I Live" and "Breathe" at the end of the document.

2000s

Rissi Palmer was featured in a documentary called "Waiting in the Wings: African-Americans in Country Music" in 2004 that wondered why Black people were so unsuccessful in the genre despite their many contributions. Her debut single in 2007 became the first song by a Black female artist to make it on the Billboard country singles chart since Dona Mason. She sang at the Grand Ole Opry in 2007 but her fame has mostly faded.





In an interview with the Tennessee Tribune in 2023, she expressed her disdain for the lack of representation in country: "Dr. Jada Watson's "'Redlining in Country Music' report shows that BIPOC women only made-up point-five percent of all radio airplay between 2002-2020. This is why there have only been five solo Black female Country artists to chart EVER: Linda Martell, Ruby Falls, Nisha Jackson, Mickey Guyton, and me." Listen to her performance at the Opry at the end of the document.


The Dixie Chicks' 1998 album, "Wide Open Spaces," became their first major hit, selling more albums that year than every other country artist or band together. They refused to cut the banjo and fiddle to avoid "going Nashville." In doing so, they brought country back to its traditional bluegrass roots.





In 2003, they infamously commented on how they were ashamed that President W. Bush was from Texas because they disapproved of the Iraq War. This sparked a flood of threats from the American public, accusing them of being traitors, burning their CDs, and banning them from the radio, effectively destroying their career until they released the album "Gaslighter" in 2020 and changed their name to The Chicks. The Chicks are the best-selling female country band of the last 30 years and have been consistent feminists, inspiring future famous artists like Taylor Swift to begin their music careers. Listen to "Goodbye Earl" at the end of the document.

Taylor Swift released her debut album in 2006, where it peaked at number five for 275 weeks in the Billboard top 200. She became the youngest person to win the BMI Songwriter of the Year in 2007 at just 18 years old. The same year, she won awards at the CMAs, ACMs and AMAs and was nominated for the Best New Artist Grammy. Her second album, "Fearless," debuted at number one on the Billboard Top 200 and was the number one best-selling album in the USA. She won Female Artist of the Year from Billboard and four Grammy awards, including Album of the Year, in 2009.



Her third album, and last explicit country album, "Speak Now," sold one million copies in its first week and debuted at number one on the Billboard Top 200. She won dozens of awards for the album, including Billboard's Woman of the Year, ACM's and CMA's Entertainer of the Year and BMI's Songwriter of the Year. After "Speak Now," Taylor Swift began transitioning to pop music, but she holds dozens of records in the music industry. She became the youngest artist to win the Grammy for Album of the Year, write a number-one song on the Hot Country Songs chart and win CMA's Entertainer of the Year award.

She holds the record for the most AMAs in history at 40, the most number-one hits in the Billboard chart for digital song sales at 24 and the most weeks at number one on Billboard's Top Country Albums (breaking Shania Twain's record) at 98 weeks. She is also the first female artist to win three Album of the Year Grammy awards and is the highest-earning female musician of the past decade. She is the only artist in history to have all top ten spots on the Hot 100 chart in one week. Listen to her debut single "Tim McGraw" at the end of the document.

2010s

The 2010s were a decade where Black female country artists began to get more recognition than before. Rhiannon Giddens has created over a dozen albums and EPs solo and with her groups The New Basement Tapes and the Carolina Chocolate Drops. She won the Best Traditional Folk Album Grammy in 2011 for "Genuine Negro Jig" with the Carolina Chocolate Drops. She has a place in the North Carolina Music Hall of Fame with the rest of the Drops. Listen to the titular song on the album at the end of the document.



Mickey Guyton is 40 years old and has been recording for almost a decade. She has two studio albums and an extended play record. In 2015, she sang her debut single "Better Than You Left Me" at the Grand Ole Opry, becoming one of the most recent Black female singers to sing there. She was nominated for best new female artist at the ACM awards in 2016, and in 2020, she was the first Black female solo artist to perform at the ACMs. Listen to "Better Than You Left Me" at the end of the document.

2020s

Maren Morris first won a Grammy with her debut single "My Church." In 2020, she won the CMA Female Artist of the Year award for her song "The Bones," the most successful female country single in Billboard history. In her speech, she thanked six Black female country artists for pioneering the genre, including Linda Martell, Yola, Mickey Guyton, Rissi Palmer, Brittney Spencer and Rhiannon Giddens. Listen to "The Bones" at the end of the document.



Only 13-15% of songs on the radio are made by women, and even fewer are Black women. "Honky Tonk Angels" is a start to recognizing the women that have shaped the country genre for almost a century, changing its style, winning dozens of awards, and bringing it into the mainstream culture of America.
