



Wery's compositions have been performed and recorded around the world and in 2021 Wery's String Quartet was the Grand Prize winner of the Classic Pure Vienna International Music Competition. In addition to composing and conducting, Wery is an active woodwind doubler—performing on flute, clarinet and saxophone. Mr. Wery received his bachelor's degree at the North Carolina School of the Arts and his Master's at the University of Denver.

Authors Bios:

Gerry Goffin — Born in Brooklyn in 1939, Gerry Goffin met Carole King at Queens College and their musical collaboration began almost immediately. They married in 1959 and that same year wrote their first hit song "Will You Love Me Tomorrow?" (The Shirelles). The duo penned more than 50 Top-40 hits including "The Locomotion," "Natural Woman" and "Up on the Roof." In 1987, Goffin and King were inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame, and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1990. Goffin has left an indelible mark on American music.

Carole King—Pop music would be very different without the contributions of Carole King, who at age 17 wrote her first #1 hit with Gerry Goffin, "Will You Love Me Tomorrow," for the Shirelles. The dozens of chart hits Goffin and King wrote during this period became legendary but it was 1971's "Tapestry" that took King to the pinnacle, speaking personally to her contemporaries and providing a spiritual musical backdrop to the decade. More than 400 of her compositions have been recorded by over 1,000 artists, resulting in 100 hit singles and six Grammys.

Douglas McGrath was a filmmaker and playwright. Most recently, he directed the HBO documentary "Becoming Mike Nichols." He collaborated with Woody Allen on the screenplay

for "Bullets Over Broadway," for which they were nominated for an Academy Award. He wrote and directed the Oscar-winning "Emma" from the Jane Austen novel; "Company Man;" "Charles Dickens's Nicholas Nickleby," which won the Best Ensemble Cast from the National Board of Review; "Infamous;" and the HBO documentary, "His Way," nominated for an Emmy for Outstanding Nonfiction Special. His play "Checkers" opened the 30th anniversary season of New York's acclaimed Vineyard Theatre. His book "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical" was nominated for Tony, Drama Desk and Outer Critics Circle awards. Douglas McGrath passed away on November 4, 2022.

Barry Mann has written the melodies of some of the most influential pop songs in musical history. In addition to "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," the most-played song of the last century, and the songs heard in "Beautiful," he composed later standards like "Somewhere Out There" (winner of two Grammys), "Here You Come Again," "Sometimes When We Touch," "Just Once" and "Don't Know Much." Together he and Cynthia Weil have amassed an incredible 112 pop, country, and R&B awards from Broadcast Music Inc. for significant radio airplay. He has been inducted into both the Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Cynthia Weil was the acclaimed lyricist of classic songs such as "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," the most-played song of the 20th century. In addition to the songs heard in "Beautiful," she set the words to later standards including "Somewhere Out There," "Here You Come Again," "He's So Shy," "Just Once" and "Don't Know Much" to name just a few. Weil was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame, the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, honored with multiple Grammy nominations and two Grammy awards for "Somewhere Out There" as the Motion Pictures Song of the Year and Song of the Year. Weil passed away on June 1, 2023.



MUSIC LEGEND, CAROLE KING



A true legend, Carole King is one of the most successful, celebrated and iconic female singer/songwriters of the 20th century, and perhaps, of all time.

Born on February 9, 1942, Carole King has been making music since 1958. At the age of 17, she co-wrote (with her then husband Gerry Goffin) her first number 1 hit, "Will You Love Me Tomorrow" for the Shirelles. Together, King and Goffin wrote dozens of chart topping hits, songs that have become part of music legend and a part of the fabric of Americana.

King and Goffin Songs

"Take Good Care of My Baby" (Bobby Vec, 1961)

"The Loco-Motion" (Little Eva, 1962)

"Up On the Roof" (The Drifters, 1962)

"Chains" (The Cookies, 1962; The Beatles, 1963)

"Hey Girl" (Freddie Scott, 1963)

"I'm Into Something Good" (Herman's Hermits, 1964)

"Just Once in My Life" (with Phil Spector for The Righteous Brothers, 1965)

"Don't Bring Me Down" (The Animals, 1966)

And in 1967, "Natural Woman" was immortalized by Aretha Franklin.



To date, more than 400 of
Carole King's compositions
have been recorded by over
1,000 artists, resulting in 100
hit singles!

Carole's 1971 solo album, "Tapestry," took her to the pinnacle of her career. She won four GRAMMY Awards® for the album, including: Record, Song and Album Of The Year, as well as Best Pop Vocal Performance, Female. "Tapestry" remained the best-selling album by a female artist for a quarter of a century. Carole went on to amass three other platinum and eight gold albums, and in 1998 "Tapestry" was inducted into the GRAMMY Hall Of Fame®. Oh, and while she was recording her phoneme solo album, James Taylor recorded her song "You've Got a Friend" which went all the way up to number one!

In 1987 Carole King was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and later that same year Goffin and King were awarded the National Academy of Songwriters' Lifetime Achievement Award. In 1990 the duo was also inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. In 2002 Carole was honored with the prestigious Johnny Mercer



Carole made her solo debut in 1960 with a song called "Baby Sittin" and, two years later, her demo of "It Might As Well Rain Until September" mad the Top 25 in the U.S., climbing all the way to No. 3 on the British chart.

Award from the Songwriters Hall of Fame. In 2004, Goffin and King received the Trustees Award from the Recording Academy[®].

King has remained active as the 21st century has begun. The recipient of a number of esteemed awards and honors, she's remained in the public's eye with her musical and literary work, was a guest actor on "The Gilmore Girls" TV series (for which she wrote and sings the theme song) and is involved with several environmental organizations that support wilderness preservation, specifically with organizations in Idaho, where she resides.



Her incredible achievements also include a 50th anniversary Troubadour reunion run with James Taylor, the RIAA gold-certified "Live At The Troubadour" album, a 60-concert Troubadour Reunion world tour in 2010, and the feature-length documentary "Troubadours: Carole King/James Taylor & The Rise Of The Singer-Songwriter," which premiered on PBS' American Masters in 2011.

In 2012, Carole received the BMI Icon Award and Honorary Doctorate from Berklee College of Music; and published her memoir, "A Natural Woman"—which debuted on *The New York Times* best-seller list at number six. In 2013 she received The Recording

Academy Lifetime Achievement Award and became the first woman to be awarded The Library of Congress Gerswhin Prize for Popular Song, presented by President Obama.

On January 12, 2014, "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical" opened on Broadway and became the hit of the season winning a GRAMMY® for Best Musical Theater Album and two Tony® Awards. King was also honored as MusiCares Person Of The Year in January of 2014.

In 2015 she was introduced as a Kennedy Center Honoree for her lifetime contributions to American culture through her music and the following February PBS premiered "American Master—Carole King: Natural Woman," a documentary about her life and work.

In 2016 she returned to the UK stage (for the first time in 27 years) to perform "Tapestry" to a sold-out BST Festival at London's Hyde Park (the 65,000+ audience spanned multiple generations, highlighting the timelessness of Kings music).



In 2019 she performed at the national "A Capitol Fourth" concert in D.C., and at the Global Citizen Festival in NY's Central Park. In 2021 she was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame for a second time, becoming the first person to be inducted separately as a songwriter and a performing artist. She also wrote a new song in 2021, "Here I Am (Singing My Way Home)," with Jennifer Hudson and Jamie Hartman, for Hudson to sing as Aretha Franklin (in a biopic about Franklin).


Notable Music Icons also in "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical"

Cynthia Weil: married to her greatest professional collaborator, Barry Mann, is considered to be one of the most gifted and influential pop lyricists of our time. She received the first-ever National Academy of Songwriters Life Achievement Award, honoring her for the duos many hits, including "On Broadway," "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" (written with Phil Spector), as well as the Academy Award and Golden Globe-nominated Linda Ronstadt and James Ingram hit "Somewhere Out There" from Steven Spielberg's movie "An American Tail." Weil's songs are said to have helped define what it means to be young, to be in love, to be committed and passionate—in short, to define the many emotions that make up the human condition. Weil and Mann were close friends and competitors with Carole King and Gerry Goffin and in "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical," Weil and Mann are given their due as two incredible songwriters who penned the soundtrack to a generation,

Barry Mann: married to his greatest professional collaborator, Cynthia Weil, Mann's name is synonymous with some of the greatest and most enduring songs in the entire American Musical spectrum, including "On Broadway." which was one of the hits that started (in the early 1960s) a catalog of songs. After a summer singing engagement at a resort in the Catskills (in 1958), Mann began writing songs. His first success, "She Say (Oom Dooby Doom)," was recorded by the Diamonds and became a Top 20 hit in 1959. He would meet and marry Weil in 1961 where the songwriting success continued. His only chart success as a performer was the novelty song he wrote, "Who Put the Bomp (In the Bomp, Bomp, Bomp)." Mann and Weil



have been honored with over 108 pop, country and R&B awards, as well as Lifetime Achievement Awards from the National Academy of Songwriters, The Clooney Foundation's Award for Legendary Song Composition, as well as an Oscar and Golden Globe Nomination and double Grammy Awards® for "Somewhere Out There" and more.

Though he had been writing lyrics since he was eight years old, he had never before (before Carole King) found a collaborator with whom he felt comfortable. They met and clicked. They married in 1959 and both took jobs to support their musical endeavors. Their first break came with The Shirelles recording their song, "Will You Love Mc Tomorrow?" Over the next eight years, the Goffin King duo enjoyed over 50 top 40 hits! Goffin also collaborated with Barry Mann on the top ten hit, "Who Put the Bomp (In the Bomp, Bomp, Bomp)." Despite Goffin's marriage to King ending in 1968, the duo continued to work together. In the 1970s, Goffin would also collaborate with a variety of other songwriters including Russ Titelman, Barry Goldberg and Michael Masser. Goffin and Masser earned an Oscar nomination for "Theme From Mahogany (Do You Know Where You're Going To)," recorded by Diana Ross. Goffin continued to produce hits into the 1980s and '90s, including the GRAMMY®-winning song, "Savin' All My Love for You," that catapulted Whitney Houston to stardom! He was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame® in 1990. And much of his songwriting, in collaboration with King, is featured in "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical."

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
